RE: Testimony in support of HB 6355

Dear Honorable Representative Kahle and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on a topic that is of great importance to individuals with mental health conditions who are experiencing an exacerbation of symptoms and who find it necessary to seek emergency psychiatric care.

My name is Marianne Huff, and I am the President and CEO of the Mental Health Association in Michigan (MHAM). MHAM is the state's oldest advocacy organization that is concerned with ensuring that adults and children with mental health conditions and addictions have access to quality behavioral health services and supports. I am here today to talk to you about the importance of ensuring that individuals in need of emergency psychiatric treatment are able to obtain an assessment and evaluation in a timely manner.

The lack of access to appropriate inpatient psychiatric treatment has been an issue for a long time but it has been exacerbated by the pandemic. For many years the community mental health system has been responsible for assessment and evaluation of individuals with psychiatric emergencies who either do not have insurance or who have Medicaid. We are aware of the shortage of inpatient psychiatric beds across this state, but the wait time for an assessment for inpatient treatment can also be problematic. This is especially true when an individual is in the throes of a mental health crisis and is placed in a regular hospital emergency room where the wait times can be extraordinarily lengthy.

For individuals who have Medicaid or who do not have insurance, the community mental health system is required to provide assessments within three (3) hours of the time in accordance with the Michigan Mission-Based Performance Indicator System. MMBPIS, as it is known, is part of the contract that the Prepaid Inpatient Health Plans (PIHPS) and the community mental health services providers (CMHSPS) have with the state of Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. The CMHSPS and the PIHPS are required to track adherence to the three (3) hour requirement and are to meet the standard 95% of the time. However, there are times when the CMHSP is not able to meet the standard and that is why HB 6355 is important. Families and individuals should not have to wait for hours to get an assessment completed when there is a crisis.

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HB 6355 does a few important things: 1. It would codify the three (3) hour standard that CMHSPS/PIHPS must meet when completing assessments for inpatient hospitalization; and 2. It would give the hospitals and the patients another option for an assessment to be completed by another appropriately credentialed mental health clinician that is employed by another entity, such as the hospital, if the CMHSP/PIHP cannot get it completed in three hours. This will ensure that the assessment is completed in a timely manner.

Finally, I am including parts of the Michigan Mission-Based Performance Indicator System report for FY '21 that has data for the indicators that measure the percentage of children and adults receiving a preadmission screening for psychiatric inpatient care for whom the disposition was completed within three hours. The standard is for assessments to be completed within the time frame 95% of the time. I wanted the committee to be aware that the three hours that are in the bill are required by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). At the same time, the three-hour requirement should be codified in the law.


