## Department of Health and Human Services

The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) was created through the merger of the Department of Community Health (DCH) and the Department of Human Services (DHS) under Executive Order 2015-4.

- The Health Services portion of the DHHS budget provides funding for:
  - Medical services programs, including Medicaid and the Healthy Michigan Plan
  - Behavioral health services, including substance use disorder services
  - Public health programs
  - Aging and adult services
- The Human Services portion of the DHHS budget includes programs and services to assist Michigan's most vulnerable families. This includes:
  - Public assistance programs
  - Protecting children and assisting families by administering foster care, adoption, and family preservation programs, and by enforcing child support laws

## **Key Budget Terms**

**Fiscal Year:** The state's fiscal year (FY) runs from October to September. FY 2017-18 is October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018.

**Appropriation:** Authority to expend funds. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend. Constitutionally, state funds cannot be expended without an appropriation by the Legislature.

**Line Item:** Specific appropriation amount in a budget bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

**Boilerplate:** Specific language sections in a budget bill which direct, limit, or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

**Lapse:** Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless designated as a multi-year work project under a statutory process. Lapsed funds are available for expenditure in the subsequent fiscal year.

Note: Unless otherwise indicated, historical budget figures in this presentation have <u>not</u> been adjusted for inflation.


## **Funding Sources**

## FY 2017-18 DHHS Budget

| Fund Source  | Funding          | Description  |
|--|------------------|--|
| Gross Appropriations                                     | \$25,509,303,800 | Total spending authority from all revenue sources  |
| Interdepartmental Grants (IDG) Revenue                   | 13,640,900       | Funds received by one state department from another state department, usually for services provided  |
| Adjusted Gross<br>Appropriations                         | \$25,495,662,900 | Gross appropriations excluding IDGs; avoids double counting when adding appropriation amounts across budget areas  |
| Federal Revenue  | 18,406,770,700   | Federal grant or matching revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes  |
| Local Revenue  | 116,545,300      | Revenue received from local units of government for state services   |
| Private Revenue  | 149,875,700      | Revenue from individuals and private entities, including payments for services, grants, and other contributions  |
| State Restricted Revenue                                 | 2,441,939,800    | State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue |
| State General<br>Fund/General Purpose<br>(GF/GP) Revenue | \$4,380,531,400  | Unrestricted revenue from taxes and other sources available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the Legislature                          |


### FY 2017-18 Fund Sources

Over 70% of the **\$25.5 billion** DHHS budget is funded by federal revenue, including Medicaid and Healthy Michigan Plan matching funds, food assistance funds, and the TANF block grant.




## **DHHS Share of Total State Budget**

The DHHS budget represents nearly one-half of the **\$55.8 billion** state budget (adjusted gross) for FY 2017-18.




## **DHHS Share of Total GF/GP Budget**

The DHHS budget also represents over 40% of the state's **\$10.1 billion** GF/GP budget for FY 2017-18.



## **DHHS Funding History**

Funding for Health and Human Services has grown by 79% since FY 2003-04, driven mainly by increases in federal funding for Medicaid, the Healthy Michigan Plan, and food assistance.



## **Appropriation Areas**

## **DHHS Appropriation Areas**

**Medical Services:** Provided under Medicaid, Healthy Michigan Plan, MIChild, and Children's Special Health Care Services; delivered by managed care plans and medical providers

**Behavioral Health:** Services provided through community mental health services programs, prepaid inpatient health plans (Medicaid-funded), and state-run hospitals; includes substance use disorder services

**Public Health:** Services addressing environmental health, infectious and chronic disease, and services for vulnerable populations; provided in partnership with local health departments

Public Assistance: Cash, food, and emergency needs support

Child Welfare: Foster care, adoption, and family preservation programs


**Field Operations:** Local county and district DHHS offices, through which most DHHS programs and services are accessed; includes child support enforcement

**Departmentwide Administration:** Central administration, including information technology

Other: Community services and outreach; aging and adult services


## FY 2017-18 Gross Appropriations by Areas

About three-quarters of the **\$25.5 billion** DHHS budget supports medical and behavioral health services, most of which are provided through Medicaid and the Healthy Michigan Plan.



## FY 2017-18 GF/GP Appropriations by Areas

GF/GP funds totaling **\$4.4 billion** are primarily appropriated for to support behavioral health services, medical services and child welfare programs.
