The State Budget Office requests this increase in spending authority in the *Environmental stewardship* line item to recognize a cooperative agreement between the department (MDARD) and Bayer CropScience. The agreement provides for the department to receive funding to support a contract with United States Geological Survey (USGS) to perform a study of the impact of an experimental pesticide on surface or ground water in predetermined sites around the state. This agreement will continue through 2021. Funding associated with this agreement is assumed in the proposed FY 2015-16 budget. Revenue associated with this agreement, which is shown as restricted *Freshwater protection fund* revenue, would be transferred from the state restricted contingency revenues established in Section 206(2) of the current year budget, Article I of 2014 PA 252 of 2014. The State Budget Office indicates that the transfer is needed by March 31, 2015.

This transfer will provide increased spending authority to allow the department to expend funds associated with a federal Health and Human Services-Food and Drug Administration (HHS-FDA) *Rapid Response Team* grant. The grant was awarded in FY 2013-14, however, the State Budget Office indicates that because of the timing of this award, the department was unable to implement the approved projects prior to September 30, 2014. Grant funded activities include food safety investigation and response training exercises as well as emergency response training exercises in other states that Michigan has agreed to mentor. All activities supported by these federal funds are projected to be completed by August 31, 2015. Revenue associated with this agreement, shown as federal HHS-FDA revenue, would be transferred from the federal contingency revenues established in Section 206(1) of the current year budget, Article I of 2014 PA 252 of 2014. The State Budget Office indicates that the transfer is needed by March 31, 2015.

The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2015.

Sufficient federal funds authorization is available from the Bioterrorism Preparedness line item for this transfer as the line item authorization exceeds anticipated federal grant revenue and planned expenditures by approximately \$6.5 million.

This transfer increases the state restricted authorization for the Respite Care Program line item, enabling the Department to expend available state restricted revenues \$1,250,000 in excess of the current authorization. Carryforward funding is available from the Senior Care Respite Fund. The funds will be used for the existing program through area agencies on aging of respite care services to assist family caregivers providing care to an elderly person in need of constant supervision. Respite may be provided in the home or in an adult day care setting. Revenue to the Senior Care Respite Fund is from escheats to the state from uncashed checks paid to subscribers or providers by the nonprofit mutual insurance corporation Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan. Statutory changes in 2010 (Act 197 PA 2010) shortened the unclaimed property period for uncashed checks creating a one-time acceleration of deposits to the Fund which are being expended by the program over a multi-year period. A similar transfer was made in FY 2013-14. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2015.
