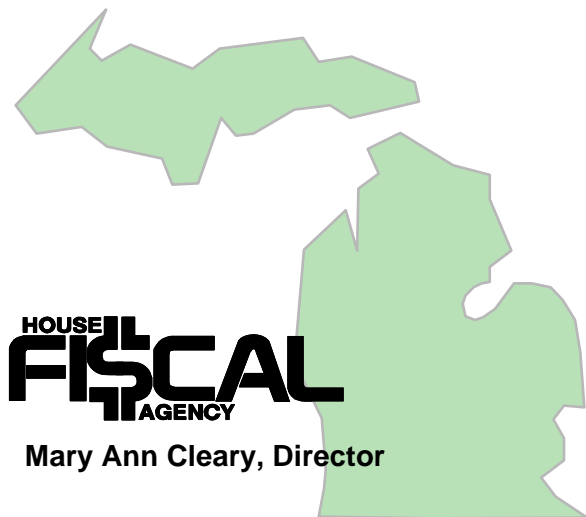

# GLOSSARY

## STATE BUDGET TERMS

**Gross Appropriations (Gross):** The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

**Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross):** The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

**Lapses:** Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

**Work Project:** A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

## APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

**Line Item:** Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

**Boilerplate:** Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

## REVENUE SOURCES

**General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP):** Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

**State Restricted (Restricted):** State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

**Federal Revenue:** Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

**Local Revenue:** Revenue from local units of government.

**Private Revenue:** Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

**Interdepartmental Grant (IDG):** Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

**Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT):** Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

## MAJOR STATE FUNDS

**Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF):** The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

**School Aid Fund (SAF):** A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

**General Fund:** The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) supports environmental protection, conservation, cleanup and redevelopment programs, and regulatory efforts established to protect, restore, and reuse Michigan's air, water, and land resources.

## SECTION 103: OFFICE OF THE GREAT LAKES

*The Office of the Great Lakes was created by the Great Lakes Protection Act in 1985 to be the lead state agency for the development of governmental policies, programs, and procedures that will protect, enhance, and guide the management of the Great Lakes. The Office serves as the chief information source on issues that involve or affect the Great Lakes, and also administers the Areas of Concern Program, the Coastal Zone Management Project, and the Coastal Management Grants Program.*

## SECTION 104: GREAT LAKES RESTORATION INITIATIVE

*The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) is a federal competitive funding program administered by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to protect and clean up the Great Lakes through restoration efforts, invasive species control, non-point source pollution mitigation, and contaminated sediment programs. The GLRI is administered by the EPA and awards competitive grants in the Great Lakes region and coordinates state, tribal, local, and industry actions to protect, maintain, and restore the chemical, biological, and physical integrity of the Great Lakes.*

*The Office of Environmental Assistance provides funding for publications, education programs, outreach, and pollution protection and environmental assistance to businesses, municipalities, and the public. The Office also administers the Pollution Prevention Local Grants program.*

## SECTION 107: WATER RESOURCE DIVISION

*The Water Resource Division protects and enhances the water quality of the state's surface waters, establishes water quality standards, assesses water quality, provides regulatory oversight for all public water supplies, issues permits to regulate the discharge of industrial and municipal waste waters, inspects wastewater treatment facilities, monitors and permits large scale groundwater withdrawals, monitors compliance with state and federal laws, and protects coastal areas and habitats. The division also administers grant programs that provide protection and remediation funding for water sources.*

Prohibits DEQ from purchasing foreign goods and services if competitively priced American goods or services that are of comparable quality are available; requires preference for goods and services manufactured by Michigan businesses and their associated subcontractors and manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans.

**Sec. 211. Businesses in Economically Deprived or Depressed Communities**

Encourages DEQ to enter into contracts with vendors located in economically depressed communities.

**Sec. 212. Disciplinary Action Against State Employees**

Prohibits DEQ from disciplining state employees for communicating with members of the Legislature and their staffs.

**Sec. 213. Rule Promulgation**

Requires a report on any policy changes made to implement a public act; DEQ is not allowed to adopt a rule that will apply to a small business if it has a disproportionate economic impact.

**Sec. 214. Legal Services**

Denies permission to hire attorneys to provide legal services provided by the Attorney General.

**Sec. 215. Contingency Fund Transfer Authority**

Provides authority for contingency fund transfers: up to \$30.0 million federal, \$5.0 million restricted, \$100,000 local, and \$500,000 private; transfers must be approved by both the House and Senate appropriations committees.

**Sec. 216. Consolidated Report on Environmental Cleanup Projects**

Requires DEQ to provide status report with detailed information on approved cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions, superfund cleanup, revitalization revolving loan program, brownfield grants and loans, leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, contaminated lake and river cleanup program, refined petroleum product cleanup program, and environmental protection bond projects.

**Sec. 217. Appropriations for Environmental Cleanup Projects**

Re-appropriates unspent funding from the Cleanup and Redevelopment Fund, leaking underground storage tank funding, bottle deposits fund, Clean Michigan Initiative Fund – response activities funding, brownfield grants and loans, and Strategic Water Quality Initiatives Fund for expenditure for any site listed in an appropriation act.

**Sec. 219. Settlement Fund Revenue Carryforward**

Allows carryforward of up to \$2.5 million of settlement fund revenue into the succeeding fiscal year.

**Sec. 221. GF/GP Lapse**

Requires report of estimated GF/GP appropriation lapses at close of previous year; report due November 30.

**Sec. 222. Restricted Fund Revenues, Expenditures, and Fund Balances**

Requires report on fund balances, revenues, and expenditures for state restricted funds for FY 2012-13 and FY 2013-14.

## BOILERPLATE SECTION INFORMATION

**Sec. 223. FTE Report by Line Item**

Requires DEQ to report on the number of funded FTEs and number of FTEs funded by line item.

**Sec. 224. Quarterly FTE Report**

Requires DEQ to report on the number of FTEs in pay status; report required quarterly.

**Sec. 225. Expenditure Posting on Internet**

Requires expenditures to be reported on the internet on a searchable website, including specific expenditure information.

**Sec. 228. Customer Satisfaction Evaluation Program**

Requires report on development of customer satisfaction evaluation program and public feedback received.

**Sec. 229. Expedited Permitting Program**

Requires report listing actions and program changes taken to implement the Expedited Permitting Program; report must include which programs have implemented the expedited program.

**Sec. 231. Website Scorecard**

Requires DEQ to maintain on a publicly accessible website a department scorecard with key metrics concerning the agency's performance.

**Sec. 232. Publication Revenue Fund Transfer**

Transfers surplus funds of up to \$72,600 from the Publication Revenue Fund to the Oil and Gas Regulatory Fund on October 1, 2013.

**Sec. 233. Request for Proposal (RFP) Language**

Prohibits Department from issuing an RFP for a contract greater than \$5.0 million unless issuing a request for information (RFI) or a request for qualification (RFQ) has been considered.

**Sec. 301. Laboratory Services Revenue Carryforward**

Allows carryforward of unspent interdepartmental laboratory revenue.

**Sec. 302. Work Projects - Environmental Response Programs**

Considers appropriations for emergency cleanup action to be a work project.

**Sec. 303. Restricted Fund Transfer: Cleanup and Redevelopment Trust Fund**

Transfers \$1.0 million from the Cleanup and Redevelopment Trust Fund to the Environmental Protection Fund.

**Sec. 304. Restricted Fund Transfer: Community Pollution Prevention Fund**

Transfers \$1.0 million from the Community Pollution Prevention Fund to the Environmental Protection Fund.

**Sec. 305. Refined Petroleum Fund**

States legislative intent to restore \$70.0 million Refined Petroleum Fund transferred to General Fund in FY 2006-07.

**Sec. 306. Refined Petroleum Fund Cleanup Site List**

Lists cleanup projects funded through the Refined Petroleum Product Cleanup Program; requires report on amount spent at each site and work performed.

**Sec. 309. Brownfield Grants Program Work Project Language**

Provides that Brownfield Grants Program funds are work project appropriations and allows carry-forward of remaining funds; projects accomplished by contract; tentative completion date is September 30, 2018.

**Sec. 310. Bonding Language**

Allows DEQ, if approved by State Budget Director, to expend GF/GP funding for cash flow requirements of projects financed by bonds if bonds have not yet been authorized; funding to be repaid to GF/GP when bonds are sold.

**Sec. 401. Aquatic Nuisance Control (ANC)**

Requires \$700,000 and 5.0 FTEs be allocated to the permit review program within ANC program; requires report.

**Sec. 405. Septage Waste Compliance Program Grants**

Allows DEQ to provide septage waste compliance services if a certified health department does not exist in a city, county, or district, or if the county health department fails to fulfill mandated responsibilities.



## BOILERPLATE SECTION INFORMATION

**Sec. 407. Groundwater Discharge Sodium Levels**

Prohibits DEQ from establishing or enforcing an effluent limitation for amount of sodium in groundwater discharge. In a signing letter dated June 13, 2013, the Governor asserts that this boilerplate section is unenforceable.

**Sec. 408. Beach Monitoring**

Provides that \$100,000 of funding appropriated in part 1 for surface water be allocated for water quality beach monitoring equipment for Lake St. Clair Metropark Beach.

**Sec. 602. Clean Sweep Program**

Directs DEQ to work with local health departments, Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, and USDA to maintain and expand the program for disposal of hazardous household chemicals and drugs; requires report.

**Sec. 603. Environmental Pollution Prevention Fund (EPPF)**

Provides that if statutory changes are made to combine certain hazardous waste program restricted funds into the EPPF, appropriations in part 1 from these funds shall be appropriated from the EPPF.

**Sec. 604. EPPF Balance Stipulation**

Provides that if the EPPF balance declines below spending levels, appropriations other than those for the Hazardous Waste Management Program shall be reduced.

**Sec. 1201. FY 2013-14 Anticipated Appropriations**

States intent that FY 2014-15 line item appropriations will be the same as those for FY 2013-14 with certain economic adjustments.

**Sec. 1202. Identification of Future Retirement Costs**

States legislative intent that the DEQ identify the FY 2014-15 retirement costs for line items listed in part 1.
