### Overview

The Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) is the state's primary regulatory agency. The department oversees regulation across a variety of areas, including: commercial and occupational activities, construction and fire safety, health care and human services, energy and public utilities, liquor control, and marihuana. Agencies within LARA are responsible for implementing and enforcing workers' compensation requirements, occupational safety and health standards, and labor and wage laws, in addition to providing vocational rehabilitation services for the blind and coordinating employment services for immigrants. Entities within LARA also conduct and adjudicate administrative hearings, provide support for several commissions, and administer multiple grant programs (including Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Grants).

### **Major Boilerplate Changes From FY 2018-19**

#### **Sec. 207. Out-of-State Travel Requirements and Report – RETAINED**

Stipulates limitations regarding conditions when LARA may send employees on out-of-state travel, further limits the expenditure of state funds on out-of-state professional development conferences, and requires a detailed report on out-of-state travel. Executive revises to delete limitations and alter reporting requirements. House and Senate retain current law.

#### **Sec. 210. Contingency Funding – DELETED**

Appropriates federal, state restricted, local, and private contingency funds of up to \$36.5 million total, available for expenditure when transferred to a line item through the legislative transfer process. Executive and House retain current law. Senate deletes.

#### **Sec. 218. Communication with the Legislature – RETAINED**

Prohibits LARA from taking disciplinary action against an employee for communicating with a member of the legislature or their staff. Executive deletes. House and Senate retain current law.

#### **Sec. 219. Television and Radio Productions – RETAINED**

Prohibits LARA from developing or producing television or radio productions. Executive and House delete. Senate retains.

#### **Sec. 220. Healthy Michigan Plan Accounting Structure – RETAINED**

Requires LARA, in conjunction with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), to maintain an accounting structure within the state's accounting system that facilitates the identification of expenditures associated with the Healthy Michigan Plan. Executive deletes. House and Senate retain current law.

#### **Sec. 226. Regulatory and Statistical Report – RETAINED**

Requires LARA to submit an annual report that specifies and summarizes statistical information pertaining to fees, revenues, expenditures, application determinations, timeliness, examinations, complaints, investigations, enforcement actions, administrative hearings, and adjudications for each regulatory product administered by LARA. Executive deletes. House revises to include the Bureau of Marijuana Regulation as a reporting entity and to require information for the three previous fiscal years. Senate retains current law.

#### **Sec. 227. Departmental Employee Performance Monitoring Process – RETAINED**

Expresses legislative intent that LARA establish a consistent employee performance monitoring process and submit a report pertaining to planned or implemented changes to that process. Executive deletes. House and Senate retain current law.

#### **Sec. 302. Fast Charging Siting Study – DELETED**

Requires the Michigan Agency for Energy, in cooperation with the Public Service Commission and MDOT, to prepare a study assessing statewide optimal siting locations for fast charging stations; includes study content requirements. Executive, House, and Senate delete.

#### **Sec. 505. Medical Marijuana Program Report – REVISED**

Requires LARA to submit a report on revenue, expenditures, application determinations, and timeliness of the Medical Marijuana Program and other specified information. Executive revises to delete application data and revenue and cost information required to be contained in the report. House retains. Senate revises to replace full appropriations committees with the subcommittees as report recipients.

## **Major Boilerplate Changes From FY 2018-19**

### **Sec. 509. Regulatory Fees on Child and Adult Care Facilities – RETAINED**

Requires LARA to assess and collect fees on child care and adult foster care organizations in accordance with existing legislation; requires the department to report these collections to the fiscal agencies. Executive and House delete. Senate retains current law.

### **Sec. 511. Notice of AFC, HFA, and LTC Facility Closing – RETAINED**

Requires that LARA properly serve a facility and notify the offices of the representing legislators when an order of suspension is received for a licensed adult foster care home, home for the aged, or nursing home. Executive deletes. House and Senate retain current law.

### **Sec. 512. Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing and Tracking Report – REVISED**

Requires that LARA submit a report providing information regarding licensing under and revenues from the Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing and Tracking Program. Executive revises to include subcommittees rather than full appropriations committees as report recipients. House revises to include the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act in the report and to include data on license renewals. Senate revises to include subcommittees rather than full appropriations committees as report recipients

### **Sec. 513. Medical Marihuana Community Impact Statements – NOT INCLUDED**

House includes language requiring LARA to submit a report on the addresses of facilities licensed under the Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act; requires LARA to work with local units to prepare community impact statements for communities with three or more licensed facilities and stipulates what must be contained in the impact statement; requires neighbor responsibility plans in certain instances. Senate does not include.

### **Sec. 514. Medical Marihuana Local Construction Labor – NOT INCLUDED**

House stipulates legislative intent that LARA encourage medical marihuana facilities to use local construction workers on any projects. Senate does not include.

### **Sec. 515. Occupational Regulation Complaints Reports – NOT INCLUDED**

House includes new language requiring bureaus in the occupational regulation appropriation unit to submit reports regarding complaints received; establishes requirements for report contents. Senate does not include.

### **Sec. 702. Vocational Rehabilitation Matching Funds – RETAINED**

Requires the Bureau of Services for Blind Persons to work collaboratively with service organizations and governments to identify match dollars and maximize federal vocational rehabilitation funds. Executive deletes. House and Senate retain current law.

### **Sec. 704. First Responder Presumed Coverage Claims Excess Funds – DELETED**

Allows excess funds received from the First Responder Presumed Coverage Fund to be appropriated in an amount sufficient to pay approved claims due in the current fiscal year. Executive deletes. House retains current law. Senate deletes.

### **Sec. 705. First Responder Presumed Coverage Work Project Usage – NOT INCLUDED**

House stipulates legislative intent that funds that have received work project status for First Responder Presumed Coverage Claims must be used to pay approved claims until additional funding is made available. Senate does not include.

### **Sec. 803. Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Performance Metrics and Report – DELETED**

Requires MIDC to implement a performance metrics system assessing provision of indigent defense services; requires a report on metrics. Executive, House, and Senate delete.

### **Sec. 804. Ethnic Affairs Commission Report – REVISED**

Requires Michigan Office for New Americans to coordinate with the three ethnic affairs commissions to produce a report detailing the commissions' activities. Executive makes technical revisions. House revises to include data on number of persons the commissions assisted with hurdles the commissions have identified and to include attendance figures for commission events. Senate makes technical revisions.

### **Sec. 806. Michigan Office for New Americans Report – NOT INCLUDED**

House includes language requiring the Michigan Office for New Americans to report on education and workforce training programs that the office has held, statistics on how many people the office has assisted in navigating the immigration system, and a description of activities for talent attraction and retention. Senate does not include.

**Major Boilerplate Changes From FY 2018-19**

***Sec. 904. Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Standards Compliance – DELETED***

Stipulates an indigent defense system's duty of compliance with standards is contingent upon receipt of a grant in an amount sufficient to comply with provisions in 2013 PA 93. Executive deletes. House retains current law. Senate deletes.

***Sec. 1001. Marihuana Educational Materials – NOT INCLUDED***

Requires the Bureau of Marihuana Regulation to use funds appropriated in part 1 to produce and distribute materials to inform children and young adults of risk associated with marihuana use. Executive does not include. House includes. Senate does not include.
