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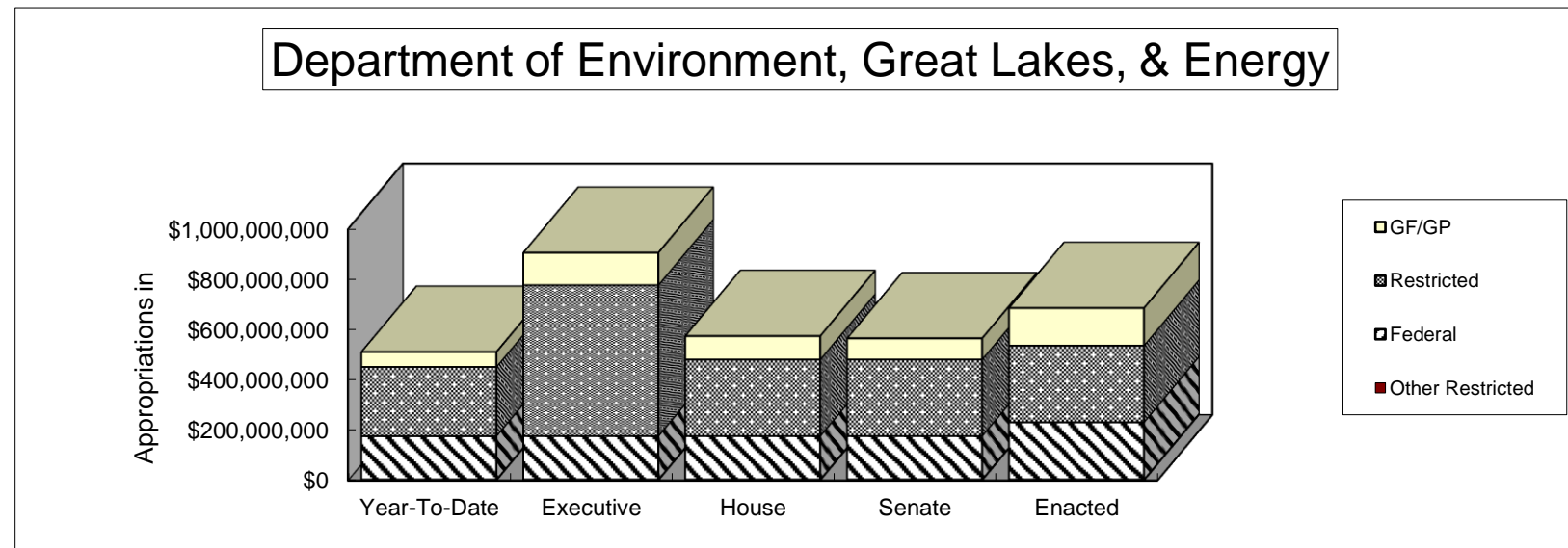

(1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for lead service line replacements, the department shall provide \$10,000,000.00 to support a local unit of government that has had multiple consecutive lead action level exceedances and has a poverty rate above 40% according to the United States Census Bureau in replacing lead service lines and improving the safety of the community's drinking water.

(2) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for lead service line replacements are designated as a work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditure for projects under this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

(a) The purpose of the projects is to replace lead service lines and provide safe drinking water.

(b) The projects will be accomplished primarily by utilizing contracts with service providers.

(c) The total estimated cost of all projects is \$10,000,000.00.

(d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.
